Why do people help one another? Why do we stop to help a stranger change a flat tire? Why do we (🔈) up late talking to our friends when they are sad? *Social psychologists study how people influence one another's thoughts, feelings, and behavior. They think about questions like these. Many have argued that we give to other people because we get something in return. All helping acts, they say, will help the helper. Sometimes the *rewards for helping are external. For example, if we lend a classmate a pen, she may lend us one later. Sometimes the rewards for helping are internal, such as feeling kind for helping others. But there are always rewards.

Even while we are helping others, our main goal is to get benefits for ourselves. (1) This idea is called egoism. It is the view held by the majority of social psychologists in the Western world. There are, however, some social psychologists who believe that sometimes people help others without () anything back. This type of helping behavior is called *altruism. Social psychologists do not agree on why people help others — egoism or altruism. But they agree that people are more likely to help in some situations and less likely to help in others.

In 1964, a shocking story was reported in many American newspapers: At 3 a.m., a young woman named Kitty Genovese was walking home from work in New York City when a man caught and injured her with his knife. According to the newspapers, she called for help, and lights came on in several nearby apartments. The articles said that 38 people saw the crime from their apartment windows, but only one person called the police, and the call came too late. Nobody tried to help her, and Kitty Genovese died.

Although many people were shocked to hear this story, it was not completely true. There was a crime, but 38 people had not seen it. Many people said they had heard something, but they weren't sure what they were hearing — maybe a couple arguing. And two people, not one, called the police. (2) One 70-year-old woman also came out of her apartment to see if she could help. She held Kitty until the police arrived.

When people read about the story in the newspapers, they thought it was completely true. They thought, "Why didn't anybody try to help Kitty?" Social psychologists heard the story and believed it too. They, too, wondered why no one had helped. They guessed that people tend not to help when a lot of other people are around. To test (3) that theory, they did several scientific experiments.

One of the best-known experiments is called the "Lady in *Distress." (4)Next, they heard the woman crying, "Oh, my foot... I... can't move it. Oh... my *ankle... I can't get this thing off me." The cries continued for about a minute and then stopped.

Would the students come to the woman's aid? When students were alone in the room, 70 percent of them went into the next room to see if the woman needed help. But when students were in the room with another student, only 20 percent offered help. The "Lady in Distress" experiment encouraged social psychologists to come to (5) this conclusion: As the number of *bystanders increases, offers of help decrease. This is called the "bystander effect."

Further experiments showed that dozens of factors influence whether or not people help. For example, people are more likely to help when someone else helps first. Even the weather may (5) an influence. (People are more likely to help on sunny days.) There are so many factors affecting helping behavior, so how can social psychologists tell when people will help? (6) They cannot. They can only make general guesses about helping behavior. For example, social psychologists say the bystander effect holds true most of the time. So, if you are alone in a city and need help, ask a person standing alone rather than a person in a group.
